Darwin: Darwin have been learning all about bread this week and made bread hedgehogs. They had great fun counting flour into the bowl, mixing the mixture and shaping it into hedgehogs. We have also created autumn coloured trees which they painted with tin foil. The children had great fun sorting leaves to create hedgehogs using their scissors skills.

Cartwright: It has been a very fulfilling week in Cartwright class. We have begun our first week of phonics and it is

going well as the children are beginning to read and write each individual sound. We are learning new songs for our forthcoming Harvest assembly and are enjoying expressing ourselves vocally!

We have been using our voices a lot this week as we have been retelling the story of the Little Red Hen using a story map and actions. We all agreed that we like raising our voice when the hen gets cross with the other animals for not helping her. This led onto a great



circle time when we discussed the importance of helping one another and showing respect to everyone.



You may have heard that Ms Gibbs became a Grandparent over the weekend to a little girl called Nancy so we've shared Ms Gibbs' excitement with the children and have asked her lots of questions.

Thank you for your contributions for the class, your support is truly valued and helps make a difference in the classroom. Do not forget our walk to the local shops next Thursday, if you are able to help please get involved. If we don't have the adult ratio we are unable to go. Have a great weekend!

Kandinsky: Kandinsky are getting to know their everyday materials really well. This week we have been material investigators. Each child made a tally chart to show what material our classroom objects are made from. We all found that the material used the most in our classroom is plastic and the material used the least is glass. We then discussed why this might be the case. It was a unanimous decision that it wouldn't be safe to have lots of things made from glass. We then all learnt the meaning of the word fragile and added it to our new vocabulary wall.



Seacole: Seacole have thoroughly enjoyed the hanging basket workshop led by Banbury Town Council on Thursday. They learnt to identify specific plants and how nutrients will maintain their growth through the Autumn. We have hung them up by the front office and are very proud of our work. We


have investigated the stability of different structures using fans and found that a square based pyramid was the strongest. This information is going to be used to help us plan our STEAM shelter design.


In Literacy, we have been editing and publishing our witch wanted posters in our Golden Writing books. Our fluency lessons have been focusing on quick recall of the multiplication facts for two, five and ten. We are also learning



how to write our numbers in words correctly up to a hundred. In maths, we have been developing our knowledge of place value and identifying the number of tens and ones in a two-digit number and placing them on a number line.

Valentina: This week Valentina have been perfecting their understanding of the three states of matter. They have created mind maps to showcase their learning and have conducted an experiment to measure the volume of air in a variety of sponges, recording their results on tables. I have been really impressed with Valentina's writing this week where they made fantastic use of fronted adverbials and expanded noun phrases to describe and sequence events.





DaVinci: This week Da Vinci class have been looking at place value and seeing how many different ways we could represent numbers up to 1000 and 10,000 using various equipment. In English we have been continuing writing our non-chronological reports all about Egyptian tombs and Tutankhamun.

We have received another letter

from James Price the alchemist who has asked for our help in plotting coordinates on a map for his journey to Egypt and so this week in STEAM we have been helping him plan his journey on an ancient treasure map.

We have been enjoying improving our football skills with shooting and accuracy passing this week and are looking forward to starting playing some mini football matches very soon!

Shakespeare: Shakespeare class have had another fantastic week. We have completed our first Golden Write in the form of a diary entry from the perspective of our main character Lily. Already the children are showing lots of progress in their writing and have worked extremely hard on their pieces. In maths, we are now very confident in



multiplying any number by 10, 100 and 1000. We have also been continuing our work on place value, comparing and ordering a range of 7-digit numbers. In STEAM, we are beginning to design our circuits for the steady hand game. The children worked really well in their groups to solve electricity problems. Finally, we were very lucky on Thursday to be joined by Mr Pemble for the whole day as part of the Young Leaders training. All children showed great levels of enthusiasm and willingness to develop their leadership skills.


