**Cycling Training**: We are looking for volunteers to help run Cycling Training for the children at our school (formally known as cycling proficiency). You need to be able to ride a bike own your own and feel confident riding it on roads. All volunteers would be fully trained by Oxfordshire County Council to deliver the cycling training to the children. We are looking to run this in the new year, it would involve 7 sessions with a small group of children from year 6, each session lasting 1-hour 30mins. We have enjoyed ordering our numbers from 1-7. Our story this week has been Peace At Last, we have measured our teddy bears to make beds for them to sleep in. We enjoyed reading the story and reordering the pictures, retelling parts of the story. We have also opened the Darwin post office, the children have enjoyed stamping and mark making in our post office book.



There has been a little bit of magic in the air, as we played Kim's game, the children had to guess what object had disappeared from the tray Shouting out the magic words.



**Cartwright**: Welcome to our Diwali Sweet Shop. We have been busy creating our new role play this week and are excited to use it. We have been learning about Diwali and understanding who might celebrate and how some traditions differ from others.

Earlier in the week some children

were standing around the play dough area challenging themselves to roll the longest snake. From the photo you can see the impressive technique used by Nikola.

**Kandinsky:** This week Kandinsky have been working hard on their addition in maths. Children have been super mathematicians completing addition calculations using lots of different methods. We have used the cherry model, the bar model and number tracks for counting on!


**Seacole:** In Seacole we have started to rehearse our Christmas Play, Lights, Camel, Action! We have been learning dances, songs



and reading our parts. Further details will be sent out shortly about tickets, but the date is 11th December. I would really appreciate your support in helping your child learn their lines and sing the songs. I am sure you will have heard and seen some of the songs and dance moves already!

We are very excited about going to visit the Fire Station tomorrow and will be taking our houses that we have made to burn. This video will be shown in our STEAM show case on the 13th in the afternoon.

Our maths focus has been recalling addition and subtraction facts within 20. We have been proving our reasoning when solving addition problems using different visual representations such as the number line, cherry and bar models. We have been self and peer assessing our writing, reflecting on our writing targets in our Golden Writing Books in Literacy. In our shared reading lessons, we have been researching more facts about London and presenting this information as a mind map.



**Valentina**: This week Valentina have worked hard during their maths lessons to apply their understanding of addition and subtraction to a new method, column addition. The children showcase some excellent understanding but not just showing their answer one way but using 3 different representations! We are had fun demonstrating our reasoning in fluency too, where we applied our number bond and times table facts to make 100 in the most efficient way. In English, Valentina have explored the features of newspaper reports using dictionaries to explore their wealth of vocabulary. The children wowed us by the knowledge that they presented when creating their STEAM mind maps this week, and we are all looking forward to putting our knowledge to the text when designing our two historic buildings!

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**DaVinci:** This week in Da Vinci class we have been finishing writing our Roman myths and have shared and listened to each other's work. In our maths lessons we have been looking at factors, common factors, products, multiples, prime and composite numbers. In STEAM we looked at how Roman roads were made and had a competition to see who could build the best road out of classroom materials. We also compared various different types of Roman transport such as chariots, coaches, leticas, and navis lungo (large Roman ships). We then looked at the parts of a chariot and finished the week by making a small chariot template out of paper.

In PE we have had great fun practising our catching and throwing skills with a mixture of invasion games such as bench ball and dodgeball.



**Shakespeare:** "On Tuesday, we went to Tudor Hall to take part in a Geography Game show with Neal Nicholls. When we got there, there were lots of different teams taking part so we were all a bit nervous to begin with, but this was soon forgotten! Ass



soon as Neal started drawing, we were all incredibly amazed by his art skills. He drew a map of the world from memory starting with Alaska. He then left some clues on the map so we could work out where the countries were for example, he drew the Eiffel Tower as a clue for France. At the end, we had an extra session with Neal where he gave us some autographed pictures and prizes." – Bailey

"On Wednesday, Year 5 went to Tudor Hall to take part in a hockey tournament. We didn't have much experience of hockey so we had a quick coaching session with some of the teachers. Even though we didn't win our games, we all tried really hard and it helped us to practise our hockey skills. It was also really fun talking to the young leaders at Tudor Hall." – Noel

We started the day with an assembly during which the children were able to learn more about Westmorland from Jess and Gareth (engineers). They spoke to the children about the different things they tested and gave the children an opportunity to ask some questions.

Later in the day, Niall Dodds the Managing Director of Westmoreland came to school with engineer Andy Eaton and presented the school with an AED machine for which we are extremely grateful. These machines have saved lives up and down the country, we hope it will never be needed at William Morris but are glad to have one just in case! As part of the presentation, Drew Kamphuis from First for Safety Oxfordshire delivered training in the use of the AED to some of the children in KS2.


