

In our writing we have been continuing to look at newspaper reports and peer assessing each other's writing. We also wish Miss Jull all the best as she is rather unwell at the moment. DaVinci: This week in Da Vinci class we have been writing our diary entries from the perspective of Spartacus and we focused on including first person, contractions and time conjunctions in our writing. In maths we have been looking at multiplying and dividing by 11 and 12 and various multiplication facts. We have also been busy learning our Roman song alongside painting and making our Roman chariots ready for our STEAM showcase. Everyone has worked really hard and showed great teamwork during our STEAM sessions this week.



Shakespeare: This week has been codes, codes and even more codes as we prepare for our STEAM showcase on Friday afternoon. We have been using pringles tubes to create a model of the enigma machine and its rotas, using a very complicated process to encode and decode messages. Lots of children have been creating models at home as well: so far, we have had two Anderson shelters, a plane and a model enigma machine! We have also been writing an explanation text all about how to stay safe during an air raid. We have been reading some real documents sent out to members of the public during the war giving them advice on what to do should they hear the warning siren. All the children thoroughly enjoyed watching both the KS2 and EYFS Christmas shows this week - we thought all the children did a fabulous job!


