Darwin: Darwin have become builders this week, we have been making straw, stick and brick houses for our 3 little pigs. The children enjoyed collecting all the sticks from outside, some of our sticks were too long, so the children decided that they should make them shorter by breaking them. They worked really well as a team and did some really great problem solving and measuring. We have

been talking a lot about our feelings and how we feel. The children have been using the Zones Regulation to help them express their feelings. The class teddy was sad at school today and the children talked about how they could make him feel happy again.

Cartwright: This week Cartwright class have been reading the story of 'The Three Little Pigs'. They have been discussing their favourite part and writing speech bubbles for the characters. They have also been talking about the materials used for the houses and why some were not suitable. The number of the week was 15 and the children explored it in various ways. In maths, the children have been investigating subtraction and practising taking away from a number. The children have also been printing and making their own pieces of art work.



Kandinsky: Kandinsky have been making and testing prototype axles and wheels, ready to build their vehicles for STEAM. We all learnt that for the wheels to roll in a straight line, the axle has to go through the centre of the wheel.



Seacole: This week we thoroughly enjoyed our pottery lesson and have been learning how to apply glaze on to ceramics to create different effects. In our Art lessons we have been making a ceramic collage of our school logo, so watch this space!


In Literacy we have started to use synonyms in our narrative openings and reflecting on our writing through self and peer assessments. We have been adding and subtracting two 2 digit numbers in our Maths lessons, focussing on using our preferred methods of calculating to explain our reasoning.



Our STEAM challenge has been to make paper helicopters and predict if they will stay in the air longer with or without paper clips and reflecting on how propellers aid flight.

Valentina: This week Valentina have worked really hard to show off their new maths learning when completing PIXL assessments. They all did very well and showed amazing resilience. I was blown away by the descriptive writing that they produced on the Iron Woman which included metaphors, similes and expanded noun phrases. During our STEAM lessons we have been on a mission to save the planet! After learning about the damage that fossil fuels have done to our planet we have investigated different methods of turning the turbine to replace the need to burn fossil fuels. The children then designed their methods of generating electricity by sketching an exploded diagram in their

books. Ask you children at home: Why do we need to find renewable methods of generating electricity?



Da Vinci: This week in Da Vinci class we have been looking at a Victorian newspaper article and have discussed the difference between fact and opinion. We then highlighted parts of an article which we considered to be fact and those that we felt were more opinion.

In maths we have been focusing on our 11 and 12 times tables and in STEAM we were testing different materials for their conductivity. We also began designing our torches and testing which materials would be best to use for a switch.

On Wednesday, Da Vinci class were very lucky to visit Westmoreland testing centre in Banbury. We were split into two groups and were able to see various experiments and saw how much force it takes to smash up different materials. We had a really good day and were so pleased to receive such wonderful goody bags!



Shakespeare: This week,
Shakespeare class have been
involved in two exciting trips. On
Wednesday, the whole class visited
Westmoreland Mechanical Testing
Facility to be engineers for the
afternoon! We were shown around
the facility and watched lots of
different demonstrations including
putting tomatoes in liquid nitrogen
and investigating how tensile
different materials are. It has
inspired many of us to become
engineers in the future! Some



members of Shakespeare class also took part in a hockey tournament at BGN School on Thursday morning. They really enjoyed the challenge of playing against other schools and improving their skills.




