Monday



Darwin - We have been learning all about birthdays, we have made a birthday card for the queen. We talked about having two birthdays and why we would like to have two birthdays. The children said they would like cake and presents. We have been practicing our daily phonic sounds, keep up your writing Darwin you are doing a great job.

Cartwright – Cartwright class have continued to impress me with their beautiful handwriting and fantastic phonics work. They have been telling me lots of information about themselves including their favourite foods, what they like to do and who is in their family. They have created lovely family portraits and enjoyed spending time doing some of their favourite things. In maths they have been looking at doubling and have really impressed me with how well they have grasped the new learning.

Kandinsky - Kandinsky have continued to work on activities set last week. It has been fantastic to see children active on Numbots improving their maths fluency for rapid recall. Children have also been working on measuring activities and enjoying the practical aspects of maths.

Seacole - Today we have been thinking about design ideas for the Art Sculpture Competition for Banbury Rise Housing reflecting on local history or nature. Some children who were in school have produced pieces of Art celebrating World Ocean Day.

Valentina - This week in maths Valentina are starting a new topic – fractions. Today, we explored different fractions and the concept of equivalent fractions using pictorial representations as a visual aid. In English, we recapped our knowledge on direct speech punctuating the spoken words accurately using inverted commas. I have been blown away with Valentina's dedication with the presentation particularly when writing out their spellings where they are demonstrating fantastic joined handwriting.

Da Vinci - Today Da Vinci class have been focusing on their science and as part of our new STEAM topic we have been exploring sound. We learnt how sound is made and saw how sound can make certain objects move and vibrate. I enjoyed seeing how some of you were able to demonstrate this using object at home.

Shakespeare – We have been continuing with our writing this week inspired by the clip 'The Alchemist'. Today, we have been writing explanation texts to show how the gold machine works and what it can do. Some children chose to explore some of the activities online for World Ocean Day and enjoyed learning about how we can have a more positive effect on the world.

Tuesday



Darwin - we made an indoor tea party, we talked about the food we liked to eat, we made a collage of our favourite foods. We draw the foods we would like at our tea party. In math's we played a game of bingo with our families, we rolled the dice then counted out the number. The winner was the first person to fill their tens frame. Great job Darwin.

Cartwright – Cartwright class have continued to tell me all about themselves and in return I have told them about myself too. I have enjoyed hearing thier favourite songs and in some cases have been sent a brilliant dance to go with it. They have continued to do some fantastic work on doubles and enjoyed the story of 'Alison Hubble who went to bed single and woke up double'. The children have also enjoyed sending me some fantastic pictures of plants they have been growing at home linked to our spring topic last term. Great work Cartwright Class.

Kandinsky – Kandinsky have started learning all about the four seasons. Children enjoyed the 'Guess the Season Quiz'. They were shown a small snippet of a picture and were challenged to identify the season before the picture was revealed. Challenge completed! Well done Kandinsky.


Seacole - We are continuing to learn our common exception words using the daily precision teaching strategy as well as using the interactive games on the spelling frame website to test ourselves on the new spelling rule of the week. Keep up the good work Seacole!

Valentina - Today Valentina have continued to practise their common exception words and have been working hard to spot links and patterns between words on spelling frame. In maths, we have continued to look at equivalent fractions and have been introduced to methods of simplifying them based on common denominators. In English, we have revisited our understanding of alphabetical order and used this to practise our dictionary skills.

Da Vinci - Today Da Vinci have been working on hard on decimals, tenths and hundredths in maths and have been revising fronted adverbials in English. Well done for working so hard again today!

Shakespeare - Today, Shakespeare class have been solving a range of mathematical problems using their reasoning skills. They have also been writing an advert to persuade people to buy the gold machine from The Alchemist. I was definitely persuaded!

Wednesday



Darwin - As we continue to learn about birthday and the queen, we looked at a picture of the queen crown. We talked about why we liked it, and the colours. The children designed their own crowns, great job Darwin. We played a math's game where our adults gave us a number and we held up the same amount using our fingers. Keep up your home learning Darwin class.

Cartwright – Today we have begun to look at sharing amounts and halving in our maths learning. We have also been looking at a picture of a familiar person and seeing if we know who it is- it is... The Queen. We learnt about the Queen

having two birthdays and designed her a new birthday crown. Children even wrote cards and letters to the Queen, some asked if they could visit her after the virus. Some of the class have been preparing to return to school tomorrow so we have been looking at what our classroom will be like and some of the information around our Cartwright Bubble.

Kandinsky – Kandinsky have been identifying questions within a text. They then had a go at writing their own questions. It was great to see sentences that consistently start with a capital letter, have clear finger spaces, super neat writing and of course they were perfectly punctuated with a question mark.

Seacole – In maths this week we are continuing to consolidate our learning about fractions as well as keeping our mental arithmetic skills on the boil with the fluency apps. Many of the children are working hard to beat their personal scores, demonstrating our school values of determination and resilience to continue to excel.

Valentina – Valentina have really impressed me today with some amazing thesaurus work where they embedded high quality verbs and interesting adjectives into their writing. In maths, we continued to practice simplifying fractions by finding missing numerators and denominators. I have been really impressed with Valentina's use of mathematical vocabulary. I have also received some fantastic pieces of advice about how to grow my sunflowers, with Valentina explaining to me the different components needed for healthy plant growth.

DaVinci – Today, Da Vinci used the literacy shed website and produced some work based on the video 'The lighthouse keeper'. We watched the video and discussed how the writer had created suspense throughout the film and answered some comprehension questions. You provided some really good answers - well done! We then boxed up the story and thought of vocabulary that we could use in our story opener. In maths we continued to work with decimals, tenths and hundredths.

Shakespeare – Today, Year 5 have been starting to look at how a piece of music can inspire our writing. They have been listening to 'Toccata and fugue in d minor' and thinking about how the piece of music makes them feel. In maths, year 5 have been recapping rounding decimals. In preparation for their return to school, Year 6 have been thinking about their lockdown experiences and writing a diary entry of one of their favourite days.

Thursday



Darwin - -we listened to the story The Queen Hat, in the story the hat went past landmarks in London, we talked about the different pictures. The children drew pictures of their favourite landmarks. In math's we have been counting to 20, Mrs Hancock set a challenge for us to count beyond 20. Well done Darwin class great counting.

Cartwright- Welcome back to the Cartwright Bubble, today some of our class returned to school. We spent the day getting to know our new rules routines and expectations. We thought about our feelings and how we will work in our own bubble. Although not all of the class have returned to school, we have made some characters of all the class members so the children can still play with all of thier peers. In our word aware session, we learnt the word 'onomatopoeia'. It was lovely to see some little face and well done to the children at home continuing to work hard.

Kandinsky – This week's votes for schools question asks "**Should you stand up for other people?**". Children are given different scenarios where they can discuss with their adults an appropriate action to take. This lesson seeks to engage them with the idea of speaking out on behalf of others even though their experience may be worlds away from your own - a very important message given the current climate.


Seacole – Seacole are reflecting upon the important Votes for School power point, thinking about which option they would choose from the list given in different scenarios. As well as identifying what other ways you can help someone apart from standing up for people if you do not agree with something or if there is a problem.

Valentina – This week Valentina are starting a new topic in English: Diary Writing. We have washed an interesting video on the literacy shed of a little boy called Tony who used his imagination to take himself and his Grandad on a wonderful adventure. Today, we used our deductive skills to infer how the main characters were feeling during each section of the story. In maths, we have begun our project to make our very own tuck shop by accurately drawing and measuring pieces of fruit.

DaVinci – Today, Da Vinci reflected on the Votes for Schools PowerPoint "Will the recent anti-racism protests lead to change in the US?" The lesson explored the roots of racism and what the current anti-racism and Black Lives Matter protests are hoping to achieve. I was pleased to hear that many of you had engaged in important conversations and discussions. In English we continued our work with the lighthouse film. We edited our openings and planned the rest of the story. We then wrote up our story focusing on vocabulary and punctuation that help to create suspense. I was really pleased with the work I received - well done!

Shakespeare - Following on from their work yesterday, Year 5 have been writing a setting description based on the classical piece of music. In school, Year 6 have been thinking about some of the new skills they have been working on during lockdown including learning guitar, baking and practising a language. We played some team games in the afternoon and completed our entries for the Banbury Rise art competition.

Friday



Darwin - We have had a great week of home learning Darwin, well done. In maths today we practiced our scissor skills and we used our knowledge of shapes to create pictures. We talked about our favourite part of celebrating birthdays and that is eating the cake. Well done Darwin.

Cartwright- Cartwright Bubble children have settled well into the new normal of school. It has been lovely to see some of the children in school and for me to get to know them better. They have all enjoyed spending time together in our bubble and have mastered the art of hand washing. Thank you to the children at home continuing to share your learning and experiences with me, I always look forward to seeing what you are doing. Well done to those working hard on Numbots. This week's Star of the Week is Kit Walker for continuing to challenge himself in his home learning.

Kandinsky – Children read a piece of text all about sunflowers and used their retrieval skills to answer questions about what they had read. Year 1 have been working extremely hard on retrieval and are getting better and better each week. I also love the drawings I receive alongside the reading tasks. This week, the sunflower drawings were beautiful and brightened up my day!

Seacole – Seacole are remembering to keep active either by P.E with Joe, Go Noodle on You Tube and or playing outside. Improving their running times or practicing their football skills linked to the Maths task today. Describing the position and movement the football team is travelling on a football pitch as well as participating in the fun quiz and creating their own football treasure hunt!

Valentina – Today Valentina have been working hard on their tuck shop projects using their rounding skills to decide on the price of their fruit and vegetables. In English, they have continued to look at Tony's story which they are using to plan their own piece of writing which will take the form of a diary entry.

DaVinci – Today, Da Vinci have been taking part in weekly maths challenges from White Rose and again I was really impressed with your resilience! After editing our stories from yesterday, we recapped the features of a newspaper report and then planned our report based on the film the lighthouse. I was really pleased with how well you remembered the features and the quality of your reports.

Shakespeare – Today, Year 5 have been listening to the piece of music 'A Night on Bare Mountain' and writing character descriptions of what they think the witches might look like. In maths, they have been continuing to complete the maths challenges on BBC bitesize and starting to look at music and how sound is formed. In school, year 6 have been working on a collaborative art project which will be posted on dojo!




Or search for Piota. The icon is blue and looks like this:

Using the app

Once downloaded and after your child is enrolled with us and has started, you will be able to register your device with the app, by clicking on the padlock icon:



This will enable us to tailor information to you as a parent. We can send messages to class groups and

even individually, so it's really important that you register your device as soon as you are able.

Please ensure you allow the app to send notifications as this will alert you to any information that we are sending you.
