Illness

As the weather draws in, more cold viruses are circulating – we know that children are especially susceptible to these. However, unless your child is very unwell please continue to send them in. It is really important that attendance is very strong this year, especially considering the lost time for learning during the last two years. Our expectation is that children have an attendance across of the year of 97% or above. We will be getting in touch with parents and carers whose attendance is dropping below this level to support with attendance.

Absence Procedures:

If your child is absent you must:

• Contact the school office as soon as possible on the first day of absence by email, telephone call or a voicemail left on the school absence line (please do NOT use Class Dojo or text messages to communicate about absence).

If your child is absent, we will:

- Telephone you on the first day of absence if we have not heard from you;
- If we are unable to contact you, we will regard this as a safeguarding issue and may carry out a welfare visit to your home.
- Invite you in for a meeting to discuss the situation with our Home School Link Worker or, if absences persist, with a member of the Senior Leadership Team I.e. Head of School or Assistant Head.
- Review whether the latest absence means your child has reached the Persistent Absence threshold and further action is necessary

Star of the week : Logan for helping to tidy up and Aaliyah for showing kindness.




Cartwright:



Well done for an excellent week Kandinsky class. In English, we have been learning about the story After the Storm: (A Percy the Park Keeper Story) by Nick Butterworth. The children have described the different settings using colourful semantics. In Maths, the children have been learning about different shapes and prepositions. We acted out the story We're Going on a Bear Hunt by Michael Rosen. In STEAM, we have investigated light intensity using a data logger and recorded that information in block graphs.

Then identifying the who and what doing when comparing poems. In STEAM we have been gathering and representing data using tally charts identifying the cold climates and identifying cool areas of the world.

This week in Valentina Class we have finally begun applying our knowledge of forces to learning about magnets. We have become historians and learned about the past and history of magnets, including how long humans have been aware of magnets. For our writing, we have now started a new unit: poetry. We have been reflecting upon the feelings and emotions we experience when we are reading these poems, focusing on the authors word-choice to impact us as a reader. In computing we have been evaluating the usefulness of electronic devices for a variety of tasks. We attempted to recreate 'A Starry Night' by Van Gogh. We found this really tricky, particularly trying to recreate the painting using the mousepad of the Chromebook.

This week in English, we have finally finished our narratives and have begun to look at formal letters. We will be thinking about how we can use language to persuade and write in a formal manner. In reading we became very excited when Mrs. Shepherd and Mrs. Chaplin read the commentary of an Egyptian chariot race, it was then great fun having a go at reading this ourselves, the speed was tricky but well worth the effort as it had a huge impact upon the audience. In STEAM we investigated the hardness of a range of materials, we enjoyed getting stuck into a practical fair test and are looking forward to completing more experiments in the coming weeks. In computing, we have continued to think about systems and discovered that all computers have an IP address enabling them to send messages to each other in 'packets'.
