Darwin:

This week in nursery we have been listening to the story of the Billy Goats Gruff, the children have been testing different ways of building bridges. We built a river inside and the children have to problem solve how we could get a across without getting wet feet. The children said, " Our bridge needs to be strong, so we don't fall in" . The children talked to each other about how they could cross the river without getting wet feet. In maths we have been ordering the billy goats by size from small, medium, and big. The children have been ordering themselves from the smallest - biggest.

Cartwright:

This week we have been focussing on the book Billy's Bucket by Kes Gray. The children have been using their imaginations to think about what they would like to see in their bucket. We have been talking about water and what we use it for. We thought about how lucky we are to have to have taps to get water from, and ways to make sure we don't waste water. In maths we have been using fingers to explore the fact that 6 and 7 are made up of 5 and a bit. You could play flashy fingers at home by flashing a hand of 5 fingers and 1 or 2 more, how many did you have (make it quick, they shouldn't need to count!) Have a lovely weekend, let's hope the weather stays mild!

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Kandinsky:

This week in Kandinsky Class, we have been exploring a range of additive structures in Maths. We have been representing different addition equations using part-whole models and bar models. In English, we have begun a new topic focused on the story, 'If I built a Car' by Chris Van Dusen. We have been using our senses to identify what the car looks like, feels like, smells like and sounds like. In STEAM, we were engineers and scientists. We created prototypes of wheels and axles and then evaluated them to see how successful they were.




Seacole:

In Seacole this week we have been discussing features of non-chronological reports about transport in water. As well as identifying statements, commands, exclamation and writing questions about what we want to find out about ships. In our STEAM lessons we have designed and then created using papier-mache hot air balloons which has been great fun! As well as evaluating how effective this process was and then attaching a basket to them. In Maths we have been representing multiples of ten and five in different ways and identifying patterns using hundred squares. We have been enjoying our times table rock star challenge in fluency as well as persevering to improve our time in answering them.

Star of the Week – Noah, for showing determination with his writing and enthusiasm in music lessons.



Ramanujan:

Year 4 have had a great week. This week in maths they have been looking at the relationship between the 3 and 9 times table, looking at various representations and working through word problems. In English, this week the children have been looking at newspaper reports and have enjoyed exploring first-hand what a newspaper looks and feels like. They were fascinated by all the variety of sections newspapers have, for example crosswords, pictures, adverts, sports news. We have also been looking at planning for our own newspaper report - thinking about features that we will need to include such as a headline, a picture and caption. In R.E. the children have been learning about the Jewish festival of Passover. The children thoroughly enjoyed exploring electrical circuits using wires, bulbs, batteries and motors, where they investigated with different combinations and answered questions that made them curious. Some examples included "what happens if I add another bulb?". "Would this work with a switch, a bulb and a motor?". We ended the week with a bit of drama, sharing what positive peer influence looks like and how to say 'no' politely if we don't want to do something. We enjoyed watching the performances at the end of a great week.

Davinci:

This week DaVinci class have continued to work on our biographies, thinking about the specific words and phrases we will use to bring our own biographies to life when we write them next week. In mathematics, we have been applying our knowledge of multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1,000 to help us convert units of measurement.
