Beech: This week we have been continuing our topic on Bright Light, Big City by learning about the Tower of London and the magnificent Crown Jewels. We have also been constructing obstacle courses and building pirate ships outside. We have all been drawing pirate treasure maps and labelling them. We have had lots of fun making pirate hats!

Cherry: This week in Cherry Class, the children have been working hard on their fractions. We started the week counting in hundredths then moved on to focusing on fractions that equal

one. We have finished the week converting between improper and mixed number fractions. The children have been using Cuisenaire rods to help them with their

fractions, as using visual representations of fractions is one of the best ways to learn them. The children really enjoyed making their Cuisenaire rods equal 1, showing the parts and the whole. They then used them to create mixed number fractions.

Redwood: This week Year 6 have been planning short stories based on The Call of the Wild. They have described their main characters and the story setting. The children have also created some beautiful art based on the story using watercolours. I can't wait to read their finished stories!
