Beech: We have had a very busy week this week, learning about the story of Hansel and Gretel. We have been writing and doing a lot of role-play, making trains and train tickets! The children have been singing songs and even made a band!

Next week we are going to be celebrating the Royal Wedding, if you have any pictures that the children could bring in from home (showing family celebrations), that would be brilliant! Make sure you have names on the back of them!

Year 1s have been working so hard this week! They have really enjoyed making mini storybooks about cute woodland animals. Their handwriting is improving daily and have been getting really creative with their ideas. We also did some role-play with our fox masks! In maths, we have been working on place value, making tens and ones with straws.



Willow: Willow class have had a very busy week. The children have worked extremely hard on reading test papers. We have been revising addition and subtraction word problems and have been trying to solve maths mazes. In Art, we have been creating our own little pirate ships complete with swashbuckling crew!

Elm: In Maths, we have been calculating the perimeters of regular and irregular shapes using scaling. In Literacy, we have been working on our adventure stories using adjectives and similes to create a visual picture for the reader. We are learning how to play Danish Rounders on Monday with Mr Pemble. We are looking forward to our trip to the Natural History Museum on the 5th June as part of our Science topic about fossils.



Cherry: Cherry class went on another exciting trip at the end of last week. We went to Oxford Brookes University. It was a day designed to inspire children and help them

think about their futures. It was a great day filled with a variety of activities. To begin with, the children were split into teams and worked together to answer quiz questions. They were also introduced to some of the key differences between university and school. After lunch, students currently at Oxford Brookes gave the groups a guided tour of the university, showing the children some of its fantastic facilities. To round off the day the children took part in a graduation ceremony. They were presented with a time capsule; they filled it with a paper on which they had written down some of their ambitions for their future. The children were challenged to keep it safe and open it when they are much older.

Redwood:

Redwood class have been revising key topics for their SAT tests next week. The whole class are focused and working really hard - we are very proud of how the children have approached the tests

in such a calm and mature manner. The children have planned their food and drink for SATs breakfast club running Monday to Thursday next week. We had a fantastic lesson with Mr Wright where the children were working on the laptops to create algorithms using the Scratch programme.
